2. Presentation: (50% of final grade) Students will be asked to give a group presentation which will aim to compare and contrast an English literature text and its movie adaptation. All the requirements for the presentation will be specified during the introductory class and a sample presentation will be given in WEEK 5. Students must NOT read their presentations, but must be ready to speak in their own words. Each member of the group will receive the same number of points, so students are advised to cooperate closely. Students are to prepare discussion points for their fellow colleagues.

4. A quick terminology test (20% of final grade) will be taken in WEEK 5 and will check students' ability to understand literary and film terms. These terms are essential for our in-class discussions and presentations. There are no retakes of the test."

Learning outcomes:

This course aims at analyzing chosen texts from English literature from the unlikely point of adaptation. In comparing texts and their adaptations, students will expand their existing textual analysis skills, explore the dialogue among multiple iterations of a single story. Course activities

promote active learning, with most class sessions incorporating a mix of discussion, minilectures, and group work.

Presentation 60 %:

Comparative analysis of two texts. Each student will present a comparative analysis of two samples of texts - articles, ads, etc. Selection of the samples has to be approved by the lecturer. Final mark 100% (Preparation, active participation 40 %, Presentation of comparative analysis 60 %) Minimum pass mark is 65 %. A 100-93% B 92-86% C 85-78% D 77-72% E 71-65% FX 64 and less.
