Learning outcomes:

The course is intended as an introductory course for American Studies undergraduate students to provide an introduction to some of the central themes that have organized American culture from its very discovery. We will meet some of the key figures in American history, and look at how they think about their nation in a variety of different modes, from fiction, to sermons, to poetry, and film. These writers and thinkers, from a number of different racial, ethnic, class, and gender positions, will tell us stories about the key moments in American history, its triumphs and its shames, and the continuities between its past, present, and future. The focus will be on reading a large number of short pieces and selections from longer works rather than complete books in order to generate a wide-ranging knowledge of American culture.

The main objective of this course is to gain familiarity with some of the recurrent aspects and terms in American culture and how they change over time, and possess an introductory sense of some of the vital critical works of American studies and how they relate to their own historical contexts.

Students may miss two classes. A third absence will result in a failure of the course. This course is evaluated based on continuous evaluation. The continuous evaluation consists of three parts:

- 1. 20% active participation in sessions
- 2. 30% presentation of individual work in the group project
- 3. 50% group project.

1. Active participation in classes, completing assignments and home assignments makes 20% of your final grade. Students should try to get the most out of each lesson, bring their own copies of the materials, make assignments and tasks and engage in discussions. Students should familiarize themselves with Moodle and download assigned documents from the platform on a regular basis. Each student is responsible for their own access to Moodle and is obliged to open an account and sign up to the course in Moodle by the 2nd week of the semester at the latest.

2. The presentation makes up 30% of your final grade. Each student briefly presents how they participated in the group assignment, draws attention to the interesting points of their work and prepares an activity or a discussion question for the class. The student must not read the presentation, they should be ready to give information in their own words. Although the project involves groupwork, the presentations are prepared individually and are evaluated separately.
3. The group assignment is 50% of the final grade and it is the most important part of the subject. We will discuss it at several meetings in the first half of the semester. Its goal is to promote teamwork, close and active collaboration is therefore recommended to the students. One of our meetings will be dedicated to organizing group assignments.

Learning outcomes:

The aim of the course is to acquaint students with selected texts from Slovak literature, the primary focus of which is the reflection of gender issues, the division of tasks in the society, and the social establishment that influences this division. The course is thematically focused on the works and life of the Slovak female author Terézia Vansová and her "journal" Dennica and can in some ways resemble a case study of author's works. Students themselves create new content and thus put what has been taught directly into practice

1. Active participation, completed homework assignments: (30% of final grade) Students are required to do their best with respect to active participation in seminar sessions. Students are expected to bring their own ANNOTATED copies of the required materials, complete the assigned tasks and exercises and participate in class discussions. Students are required to work with Moodle and download the required materials from there. Every student is responsible for their access of the system and should be able to log into Moodle no later than by WEEK 3. Students may at any point during the semester ask about their current score in active participation and may ask for extra assignments if unable to speak in the class.

2. Presentation: (50% of final grade) Students will be asked to give a group presentation which will aim to compare and contrast a chosen text by a British author and its movie adaptation. All the requirements for the presentation will be specified during the introductory class and a sample presentation will be given as well. Students must NOT read their presentations, but must be ready to speak in their own words. Each member of the group will receive the same number of points, so students are advised to cooperate closely. Students are to prepare discussion points for their fellow colleagues.

4. A quick terminology test (20% of final grade) will be taken via Moodle and will check students' ability to understand literary and film terms. These terms are essential for our in-class discussions and presentations.
