#### Learning outcomes:

The course is intended as an introductory course for American Studies undergraduate students to provide an introduction to some of the central themes that have organized American culture from its very discovery. We will meet some of the key figures in American history, and look at how they think about their nation in a variety of different modes, from fiction, to sermons, to poetry, and film. - 1. 20% active participation in sessions
- 2. 30% presentation of individual work in the group project
- 3. 50% group project.

1. Active participation in classes, completing assignments and home assignments makes 20% of your final grade. Students should try to get the most out of each lesson, bring their own copies of the materials, make assignments and tasks and engage in discussions. Students should familiarize themselves with Moodle and download assigned documents from the platform on a regular basis. Each student is responsible for their own access to Moodle and is obliged to open an account and sign up to the course in Moodle by the 2nd week of the semester at the latest.

2. The presentation makes up 30% of your final grade. Each student briefly presents how they participated in the group assignment, draws attention to the interesting points of their work and prepares an activity or a discussion question for the class. The student must not read the presentation, they should be ready to give information in their own words. Although the project involves groupwork, the presentations are prepared individually and are evaluated separately.
3. The group assignment is 50% of the final grade and it is the most important part of the subject. We will discuss it at several meetings in the first half of the semester. Its goal is to promote teamwork, close and active collaboration is therefore recommended to the students. One of our meetings will be dedicated to organizing group assignments.

#### Learning outcomes:

The aim of the course is to acquaint students with selected texts from Slovak literature, the primary focus of which is the reflection of gender issues, the division of tasks in the society, and the social establishment that influences this division. The course is thematically focused on the works and life of the Slovak female author Terézia Vansová and her "journal" Dennica and can in some ways resemble a case study of author's works. Students themselves create new content and thus put what has been taught directly into practice

This course aims at presenting the students with a new point of view on a topic as familiar as children's literature, and consequently attempts to encourage them to adopt a critical attitude towards all, even well-known and seemingly straightforward, areas of life.
