The course has no prerequisites but it is a prerequisite to any linguistic course in the summer semester.

The course consists of lectures and seminars. Both classes will be conducted in the hybrid form depending on the situation. For both lectures and seminars (in any form), students are supposed to be present on time not to hinder the fluency of the teaching process. If a student fails to attend a lecture/seminar it is their duty to obtain the respective information from their colleagues. Students are not allowed to record either lectures or seminars.

Lectures will be conducted in a lecture room with 280 seats. By implication, each lecture can be attended by 140 students. In case of the contact form of teaching, the list of groups that cannot come to the lecture will be published on the notice board on Monday morning (prior to the lecture on Tuesday). For these students, a meeting in MS Teams will be open and the lecture will be streamed for them. The program of lectures is specified in the table below. If the Covid situation prevents us from the contact form of lectures, there will be a switch to the online form. In the case of the online form of lectures, the tutor of the course will create a meeting in MS Teams to which all students will be invited. The program of lectures will not change (see the table below) but students are required to read with comprehension the material specified for the respective week in the third column of the table. Consequently, during the meeting mediated by MS Teams (on the day and at the time specified in the regular timetable) students can consult the reading material.

Seminars are obligatory for all students. Students are expected to attend each class (in any form) prepared – it means, they read the text assigned for the respective week with comprehension. If the form of seminars is changed from the contact to the online form, the tutor of the course will open a meeting in MS Teams and the seminar will be conducted online without any change of the program. The program of individual seminars is specified in the table below.

Students are divided in 7 seminar groups. To facilitate the teaching process, individual groups are labelled in the following way:

The assessment of the course consists of 2 parts: the continuous assessment and final evaluation. The continuous assessment consists of the following parts:

- 2 tests written in the weeks 8 and 13. The tests will be mediated by MS Teams. Test 1 will be based on the topics discussed at lectures and seminars throughout the first 6 weeks of the semester. Maximum points a student can gain is 50. Test 2 will be based on the topics discussed at lectures and seminars in weeks 7-12. Maximum points a student can gain is 50.

The minimum to pass is 65%. It is a condition for the final exam. Since it is a continuous assessment, there is no retake. In the case the students fail to achieve the required percentage in continuous assessment they will not be allowed to take part in the final exam test and they fail the course.

For the final evaluation, students are supposed to participate in an exam. The exam will be in written form. Students will be given 10 questions; each question has the value of 10 points. The form of the exam (contact vs. online mediated by MS Teams) will be announced at the end of the semester considering the actual Covid situation. In the case of the online form of any of the tests, students are expected to observe the following regulations: The tests will be mediated via MS Teams regardless the form of classes. The tutor of the course will make use of any available option to prevent students from cheating during the test. All students must attend all classes regardless they are organized face-to-face or online. Students must join the class sessions on time. Should anyone miss the first ten minutes of a class, will be marked as absent from the class. The course consists of lectures and seminars. Both classes will be conducted in the hybrid form, depending on the situation. For both lectures and seminars (in any form), students are supposed to be present on time not to hinder the fluency of the teaching process. In case of the online form of lectures and seminars, the tutor of the course will create a meeting in MS Teams to which all students will be invited. The program of lectures and seminars will not change, but students are required to read with comprehension the material specified for the respective week, so they can consult the reading material. Students are not allowed to record either lectures or seminars.

Attendance:

Seminars are obligatory for all students. Students are expected to attend each class (in any form) prepared – it means, they read the text assigned for the respective week with comprehension. During the contact form of teaching, students are allowed to miss no more than 2 seminars and are expected to come prepared and bring their own materials. If a student does not come/come prepared/bring their own materials, they are marked absent. Should a student be marked absent more than 2 times, they automatically receive a failing mark. If the form of seminars is changed from the contact to the online form, the tutor of the course will open a meeting in MS Teams and the seminar will be conducted online without any change of the program.

Continuous assessment:

Students will write a test covering the topics discussed in prior lectures and seminars and prepare a presentation on a selected topic discussed during the semester. Continuous assessment is a prerequisite for the final assessment – a written exam. Since it is a continuous assessment, there is no retake. The minimum to pass is 65%. In the case the students fail to achieve the required percentage in continuous assessment they will not be allowed to take part in the final exam test and they fail the course. In the case of the online form of the test, students are expected to observe the following regulations: The tests will be mediated via MS Teams. Students are free to choose the preferred mobile equipment for this purpose (mobile phones, tablets, laptops, etc.) but they are responsible for the readiness of the device to be used (technicalities, charged device, etc.). The tutor of the course will make use of any available option to prevent students from cheating during the test. Any identified cheating attempt will result in 0 test score and the student will be reported to the management of the Department and the Faculty.

Due to the COVID-19 situation, guest experts are not able to come and deliver the lectures on psycholinguistics in the winter semester. Therefore, psycholinguistics will be taught in the summer semester, if the situation allows. If not, students will be evaluated based on their performance in sociolinguistics.

Students can apply rules of construction of conventional sequence schemes to distinguish and create speeches. They can also group/re-group semantic packages to achieve integration of further utterances in order to establish the required interaction, they understand narration, description, argumentation, explication, illustration,... as psycho-cognitive schemes (socio-discourse macro-actions, types of texts) which are the most common forms of verbal action. They have mastered the procedures to overcome three types of difficulties the interpreters and translators encounter the most in transactions ensuring logical and formal coherence: the difficulty to select corresponding linguistic devices (expressions); the difficulty to harmonise the conceptual and linguistic aspects; the difficulty to find balance between their own perception and its linguistic expression and recipient's needs.

Brief outline of the course:

Seminar is focused on typology of errors in underlying processes in translation and interpretation: a) anaphoric expressions without a clearly identifiable reference element; b) synonyms, hyperonyms and hyponyms are not lexical elements of anaphoric relation; c) anaphora does not substitute a main term, but it refers to another term associated with mental image; d) high redundancy; e) replacement of contextual reference by deictic one; f) reference ambiguity resulting from co-reference or parallel function. Seminar also deals with essentials of semantic analysis and combinatorics, theme and rheme as pragmatic functions and implicit meaning. It involves discourse competence, function competence, and competence of text structure as well as receptive strategies and production strategies.
