The aim of the course is to present the history of the "long" 19th century from the French Revolution (1789) to the First World War (1914-1918), in political, social and cultural connections. The priorities include development of European great powers and especially development of their political system, history of great ideological systems of the 19th century, history of symbolical aspects of revolutions, history of intellectual movements and cultural institutions with political importance. The course also involves analysis of basic terms connected with the 19th century, i.e. revolution, secularization, nationalism, imperialism, liberalism, feminism. The course is primarily focused on development in Europe and USA, but also other issues of development on the Far East, dissolution of the Ottoman Empire or decolonization of Africa will be discussed. The course graduates will be able to understand basic development trends of the 19th century and to interpret also new definitions and issues connected with this period.

The French Revolution as a phenomenon of European history of Modern Era (Causes of crisis of the French society, stages and course of the French Revolution)

The Napoleonic Era in the history of France, division of the world after the Congress of Vienna in 1814-1815
