Learning outcomes:

The mission of the course is to provide students with knowledge about socially undesirable phenomena, their causes and the possibilities of control and their prevention.

During the course, students focus on acquiring theoretical knowledge based on the sociological concept of social deviations, terminological issues associated with the identification of social problems and socio-pathological phenomena, as well as the various types of most frequently described social deviations that are associated with social work.

By completing the course students:

1. Knowledge:

Students understand and can identify key terms and concepts in the field of social pathology, including definitions such as norm, normality, social control, social anomie, and social deviation. They understand various theories explaining the emergence of deviant behavior.

Students distinguish between different types of social pathologies, are familiar with the theory of the emergence of social deviations, and comprehend the mechanisms leading to deviant behavior. Students have an overview of the most common types of social deviations encountered in the

Knowledge: Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to understand the nature of science and scientific knowledge and how knowledge is obtained through empirical research. They will be familiar with the steps of preparing empirical research such as selecting a topic, studying the literature, formulating research objectives, research questions and hypotheses, selecting research participants, and preparing research variables.

Skills and competencies:

In this course, students will learn how to generate testable hypotheses, operationalize variables, and develop clear research questions essential for conducting meaningful psychological studies.

Midterm test focused on verifying the basic characteristics, significance, determinants of supervision, selected supervision techniques, their importance, and benefits - 15 points.

A total of 26 points from the continuous assessment is required to be eligible for the exam. If the conditions are not met (failure to obtain the required 26 points in the continuous assessment or failure to meet the attendance requirement), the student will not be classified in the course (grade X). Final assessment: Combined exam - written preparation /part 1/ (25 points), oral exam /part 2/ (25 points). To successfully pass the exam within a single term, a minimum of 13 points is required from each part of the combined exam. If this condition is not met, the student will be graded FX. To take the exam in the early exam period (last week of the semester during the lecture time), a minimum of 40 points from the continuous assessment is required.
