The dean's instructions for writing theses are also listed in the LS system of UPJŠ on the Social Policy course page. The paper on the topic is part of the fulfillment of the conditions. Range min. 10 standard pages. The form according to the dean's instructions, which is published in the UPJS LMS for the subject. The trainer can award the student plus points for the activity at the seminar, but also minus points if the student is not ready for the class according to the schedule of duties for individual seminar exercises in the syllabus. For the presentation in PWP, it is also necessary to add a verbal description, report, commenting on each part of the presentation, up to 10 standard pages. The midterm written examination and midterm test nor the presentation on the specified topic are not conditional on obtaining a minimum number of points. However, a minimum of 30 points must be achieved when the individual sub-conditions are added together. If the student does not obtain the minimum number of points (30) required to progress to the examination, he/she is entitled to 1 remedial written examination. In this remedial examination, the student must achieve a minimum of 30 points /out of 50/. If the student fails to meet these conditions, he/she cannot progress to the examination (he/she is graded X).

No more than 3 absences may be substituted by remedial writing assignment. Addendum: The teacher will judge, based on the severity of the reason for the absence, whether to assign a written assignment or excuse the student's absence without it.

Classified assessment is obtained based on the total sum of points from the specified conditions of classified assessment: A) Group Assignment Maximum points: 40 Minimum points: not specified Group assignment topics will be assigned to students at the beginning of the semester. The number of students assigned to each group assignment will be determined by the instructor at the beginning of the semester, based on the total number of students in the seminar. B) Individual Assignments Maximum points: 60 Minimum points: not specified Individual assignments represent a partial area of the group assignment. Students will choose individual assignments at the beginning of the semester after consultation with the instructor. Students will submit individual assignments electronically no later than two weeks before the end of the semester. The standard scope of an individual assignment is 10 – 15 standard pages. Assessment of individual assignments is primarily based on: formatting of the text, correctness of citing sources, used sources, topicality of processing, analytical development of issues, recommendations, etc. Students have the opportunity to earn a maximum of 100 points during the semester. To achieve grade A, students must obtain 91 – 100 points, To achieve grade B, students must obtain 81 – 90 points, To achieve grade C, students must obtain 71 – 80 points, To achieve grade D, students must obtain 61 – 70 points, To achieve grade E, students must obtain 52 – 60 points. Classified assessment will not be awarded to students who do not obtain at least 52 points overall. Detailed conditions for successfully completing the subject are annually updated on the subject's electronic platform in AiS2 or in the repository for digital support materials (LMS Moodle UPJŠ).	

Learning outcomes:

The course deals with the basic aspects of the process of informatization in public administration. It emphasizes the importance of making information available to the public, simplifying public communication with public administration, promoting citizen participation in the management of public affairs as well as increasing the transparency of public administration through more effective application of information and communication technologies.

Professional knowledge - students taking the course will be able to explain the background, context and basic historical context of the computerisation of society and the computerisation of public administration. They are also able to solve tasks independently but also in teamwork. They are able to present their ideas and opinions, but also to justify them in an argumentative way.
